7.05 Adoption of Special Revenue Project Ordinance Amendment 2022-5 for the Good Neighbor Homebuyer Loan Program

Program policy changes are also requested to expand the redevelopment areas to include the Massey Hill community, Bonnie Doone, the 71st District community, and Deep Creek; as well as increase the down payment assistance amount from \$20,000.00 to \$30,000.00.

8.0 STAFF REPORTS

8.01 Acceptance of the FY 2022 3rd Quarter Strategic Performance Report

Mr. Chris Lowery, Strategic and Performance Analytics Manager, and Mr. Andrew Brayboy, Senior Corporate Performance Analyst, presented this item and stated the Fayetteville City Council has worked very diligently to commit this organization to high performance and to use data and stakeholder input to create a strategic plan for the City that is forward-thinking, progressive, relevant, and outcomebased.

The Mayor, City Council, and staff share a duty to ensure that the actions of public officials, employees, contractors, and volunteers of the City are carried out in the most responsible manner possible and that City policy, budgets, goals, and objectives are fully implemented.

In February 2021, the City Council met virtually in a two-day annual retreat to refine the City's strategic plan, prioritizing Targets for Action (TFAs) for FY 2022. The City Council adopted the FY 2022 strategic plan at the June 2021 City Council meeting. TFAs are projects or initiatives identified by Council to move the needle toward defined outcomes laid out in the Council's strategic plan. TFAs are defined by a one-year action plan with milestones to focus on the work of City Council and staff.

The City Manager's Office has directed the Office of Strategy and Performance Analytics to meet regularly with teams to advance the Council's TFAs and to report progress to City Council on a quarterly basis during a City Council meeting. Many of the TFAs from FY 2021 and FY 2022 are tightly related and/or continuing. Therefore, staff has incorporated these FY 2021 TFAs into the briefing for April 11, 2022. Staff has provided the status of FY 2022 TFAs as of March 31, 2022, for Council consideration.

Commitment to performance management and strategic planning strengthens the operations of the City of Fayetteville, ensuring excellent services and high quality of life for residents. It allows for long-range planning at the organizational level with alignment to departmental operations and performance expectations. With this system in place, the City is able to allocate resources appropriately and build strategies for continuous improvement.

10.0 OTHER ITEMS OF BUSINESS

10.01 Empowering Community Safety Micro-Grant Program

Ms. Gina Hawkins, Police Chief, and Mr. Chris Cauley, Economic and Community Development Director, presented this item and stated the City of Fayetteville is providing micro-grants to community-based organizations to fund, inspire, and boost community crime reduction activities (a non-profit status is not required but for-profit enterprises will not be considered). The micro-grant is designed to support community groups' efforts to prevent crime and violence in Fayetteville. Grant awards are limited to the areas of the City that have high or recent spikes in violent crime.

The program offers local groups and non-profits micro-grant opportunities, coupled with capacity-building training, to increase crime reduction activities and build the City's local non-profit capacity. The micro-grant program provides low-barrier grant opportunities ranging from \$1,500.00 to \$5,000.00 while teaching and instructing grantees about the processes and procedures of non-profit and community organization activities. The micro-grant program will operate for 24 months consisting of four grant cycles of six months each. This program will hold grantee organizations accountable for their budget, program actions, and measurable outcomes.
