RE: Sewer Installation Schedule for Phase V Annexation Area

THE QUESTION:

Can the sewer installation schedule for Phase V Annexation Area be increased under the existing funding model?

RELATIONSHIP TO STRATEGIC PLAN:

BACKGROUND:

The funding for Phase V sewer installation was based on approximately 500 properties per year having sewer installed. The Mayor requested PWC review the funding model to see if the number of properties could be increased without an adverse impact on the funding requirement by the City or PWC.

ISSUES:

1. PWC would need to add additional personnel to maintain an increased schedule.
2. City would need to allocate (budget) additional manpower and funds to support the storm drainage improvements being done simultaneously with the sanitary sewer installation.
3. Assessments would be levied at a faster pace than originally scheduled with the people in the Phase V area.
4. Should Council decide to accelerate the schedule it will not occur for approximately one (1) year.

RE: **Review of Proposed Solid Waste Service Standards**

THE QUESTION:

Does City Council wish to modify the recommended service changes and clarifications proposed by City staff with regards to solid waste collection, bulky item collection, and yard waste collection?

RELATIONSHIP TO STRATEGIC PLAN:

Goal 3: More efficient City government - Cost effective service delivery; Objective 2. Services delivered in a cost effective manner

Goal 4: More attractive City - Clean and beautiful; Objective 1. Clean and beautiful community with less trash and less visual blight

BACKGROUND:

At City Council's April 4, 2011 Work Session, staff proposed several service level clarifications and policy changes to improve efficiency and reduce costs. The proposals were as follows:

1. Trash will only be collected from City issued/approved carts. Should one cart not provide adequate capacity, one additional City brown cart may be used for excess trash. Citizens can also purchase similar grade carts from other vendors that meet the City's standard.
2. Bags or other items outside of the cart shall not be collected.
3. Carts shall be placed within one foot of the curb or edge of the pavement and a minimum of four feet from anything that may interfere with automated collection.
4. Household generated construction debris will be collected by the city for a fee of \$50 or the homeowner may dispose of debris by taking it to the landfill.
5. A "set out", will result in a fee of \$100.00.
6. Multiple bulky collection pickups within 90 days will result in a fee of \$50 for every subsequent pickup after the first one.
7. Maximum of 30 bags will be collected per household during loose leaf collection season.
8. All yard waste must be placed within five feet of the curb or the edge of the pavement.
9. Only clear bags should be used for yard waste.

After discussion, the City Council gave tentative approval to the recommendations, except for requiring use of only clear bags for yard waste. Since that time, staff has continued work on the proposal and have brought it back for the City Council's review.

Items 1-3 would aid in the City transitioning to fully-automated side loading garbage trucks. There are four fully-automated garbage trucks in the proposed FY 2012 budget, and these collection vehicles operate with only one employee instead of two employees. As such, we will be able to reduce our staffing by 4 collectors annually once the trucks are delivered.

Items 4-6 would reduce costs and provide definitive measure of service offered by the City with regards to bulky collections. The City collected over 44,103 bulky item requests from March 2010 to March 2011. Of these, 12,279 were for construction debris. The City paid over \$48,000 for disposal of construction debris at the landfill. Most other cities in North Carolina charge a fee for collecting bulky items from households. Fees for collecting more than one bulky item in a quarter, "set outs" and for construction debris have been proposed. Attached is a list of addresses that utilized this service four or more times over the last 12 months.

Items 7-9 deal yard waste collection and seek to clarify the existing operational procedures used

by staff.

ISSUES:

Following the April 4 meeting, staff met with the City Manager and decided that item 7 would be handled as staff does currently - to ensure we are able to complete the entire yard waste route, staff only collects the first 30 bags at any home. If there is capacity in the collection vehicle at the end of the route, staff will circle back and collect the remaining bags. If there isn't capacity in the collection vehicle, staff will leave the additional bags and collect the bags in the following week. It should be noted that this occurs only at certain times of the year, and isn't a regular issue.

To highlight the proposed changes and the new fee structure, staff prepared the attached table to identify the benefits of each proposal and the transition plan.

Lastly, given the recent storm damage experienced in Fayetteville, staff recommends authorizing the City Manager to waive any fees for such events on an incident-by-incident basis. The proposed rules wouldn't take effect until July 1. It is hoped that by that time, the City's contracted debris removal agent will have removed all of the storm related construction and yard waste debris. If not, the requested waiver would authorize the City Manager to modify the fee, as needed, in the affected areas.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The annualized benefit of these proposals (new fees, fully automated trucks, route consolidations, reduction in landfill fees, etc.) would reduce the Environmental Services Department budget by approximately \$500,000 with \$78,000 estimated to come from fees for construction debris, set outs, and excess bulky pickups.

OPTIONS:

1. Authorize the City Manager to implement new service standards for residential curbside garbage collection, bulky item collection, and yard waste collection as submitted or as amended.
2. Ask staff to review other options.
3. Take no action.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Authorize the City Manager to implement new service standards for residential curbside garbage collection, bulky item collection, and yard waste collection.

THE QUESTION:

What corrections / adjustments should be considered to the recently adopted Unified Development Ordinance?

RELATIONSHIP TO STRATEGIC PLAN:

Growing City, Livable Neighborhoods
More Attractive City

BACKGROUND:

The City Council approved the November 2010 public hearing draft of the Unified Development Ordinance, along with several amendments, at its meeting on December 13, 2010. The next major steps were to complete the city-wide remapping of the zoning districts, which is a translation process between existing zoning and the closest new zoning district. During that remapping process, some inconsistencies in the text have been identified. Attached is a tracking sheet listing those items identified so far, and preliminary recommendations.

ISSUES:

The items on the tracking form generally are corrections for inconsistencies identified in the past few months.

Staff will be developing final language and may have the draft ordinances ready for most if not all items to discuss with the City Council at its work session. Following Council guidance, those items would be prepared for public hearings by the Planning Commission in May and City Council in June.

BUDGET IMPACT:

RE: **A consideration of a resolution to adopt an ordinance regulating open burning of debris within city limits**

THE QUESTION:

Whether to allow un-permitted open burning of storm debris in the City Limits of Fayetteville, or not.

RELATIONSHIP TO STRATEGIC PLAN:

To provide a safer environment and a more clean and attractive city. To provide more cost effective service delivery

BACKGROUND:

In response to the recent weather event that affected our area, the Governor has lifted burning restrictions until June, making it possible for residents within the City limits to burn storm debris. Under normal circumstances the City of Fayetteville does not allow open burning except under certain specific conditions. The ordinance under consideration would also restrict open burning of debris during future disasters, as long as debris pick up service was available.

ISSUES:

The City does not allow open burning of debris because we provide public, curbside trash pick up for debris removal, and open burning elevates the environmental hazards for those in the immediate vicinity and the potential for serious unwanted fires to neighboring structures and woodlands.

The potential for increased response to open burning calls could affect availability of resources for other emergencies.

Open burning in congested urban, and suburban, areas creates fire hazards and degrades the general quality of life for those recovering and unaffected by the storm.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The potential for increased responses to open burning calls would require greater fuel consumption and increased wear and tear to equipment.

The adoption of an ordinance to prohibit open burning would have no budget impact beyond the expenditure of contracted removal service already in place.

OPTIONS:

1. Allow open burning. This would require Fire Department resources to monitor each fire to ensure that it was being done safely and not creating an environmental hazard to neighbors. The Fire Department would be obligated to investigate whenever there was a complaint to recommend corrective actions.

2. Allow the Fire Chief or designee to issue open burning restrictions and burning bans to aid in the prevention of the spread of fire. The debris removal process is working well to systematically remove natural vegetation from affected areas. This system utilizes available resources to have storm material removed in several weeks without the added danger of unwanted fires in existing structures or woodlands.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Allow the Fire Chief or designee to issue open burning restrictions and burning bans to aid in the prevention of the spread of fire.

**AN ORDINANCE REGULATING OPEN BURNING WITHIN CITY LIMITS OF
FAYETTEVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA AND
REQUIRING NOTICE PRIOR TO OPEN BURNING**

WHEREAS, North Carolina General Statute (NCGS) §160A – 291 authorizes the City to organize and prescribe the duties of the fire department; and

WHEREAS, NCGS § 160A-185 authorizes the City to regulate, restrict, or prohibit the emission or disposal of substances or effluents that tend to pollute or contaminate land, water, or air, and

WHEREAS, NCGS § 113-60.24 regulates open burning in non high hazard counties and describes when permits are required; and

WHEREAS, Section 307 of the North Carolina Fire Code prohibits open burning except as permitted; and

WHEREAS, the City provides a public, curbside, yard waste, trash and debris pick-up service for removal of solid waste under City Code Section 22; and

WHEREAS, on April 20th, 2011, the North Carolina General Assembly ratified House Bill 268 which temporarily allows open burning of storm-related debris until June 1, 2011, notwithstanding any permitting requirements or prohibitions on open burning related to the protection of air quality provided under State law; and

WHEREAS, it is beneficial to the City of Fayetteville and its citizens to regulate open burning of yard waste, storm debris and other trash; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the failure to notify City of Fayetteville Fire Department prior to open burning creates a significant potential for danger to persons and property;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAYETTEVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Open Burning Regulatory Authority.

Through passage of this ordinance, the City of Fayetteville's Fire Marshal or the Fire Marshal's designee is hereby authorized to issue open burning restrictions and open burning bans to aid in the prevention of damage to persons and property through open fires and the spreading of fire. Burning restrictions implemented by the Fire Marshal may be more restrictive, but not less, than those set by the North Carolina Department of Natural Resources, and shall be in conformance with and consultation with the NC DNR Division of Forestry and the NC Division of Air Quality. The Fire Marshal is hereby authorized to consult with NC DNR Division of Forestry staff and NC DNR Division of Air Staff and to develop burning restriction criteria based upon the State Divisions' open burning program.

Section 2. Open Burning Prohibited

From and after the effective date of this ordinance, except as herein otherwise provided, and as provided under North Carolina Fire code Section 307, open burning of trash, storm debris, construction materials, building materials, and any hazardous materials as defined in NCGS § 130A-310 shall be prohibited within the limits of the City of Fayetteville unless permitted by the State of North Carolina and as noticed to the City of Fayetteville Fire Department as required under this ordinance.

Section 3. Exceptions.

- A. Open burning of the types, and subject to the conditions, as hereinafter stated, shall be exempt from the prohibition of Section 2 of this ordinance.
 1. Fires in authorized containers used solely for food preparation or warmth, including charcoal, gas, propane, or electric grills, camp stoves, manufactured hibachis, and wood smokers.
 2. Fires under managed supervision for which an open burning permit has been obtained, but limited to the following:
 - a. Burning to dispose of vegetative matter for managing forest, prairie, or wildlife habitat, and in approved agricultural practices.
 - b. Burning to develop and maintain land and rights-of-way where chipping, composting, land spreading, or alternative methods are not practical.
 - c. Burning to dispose of diseased trees generated on site, diseased or infected nursery stock, or diseased beehives.
 - d. Fires purposely set for the instruction and training of public and industrial firefighting personnel.
- B. Exemption to conduct fires under this section does not excuse a person from the consequences, damages, or injuries which may result from the burning of the fire, nor does it exempt any person from regulations promulgated by the North Carolina Air Pollution Control Agency or any other governmental unit exercising jurisdiction in matters of pollution or fire hazard regulation.

Section 4. Duty of Enforcement Officials.

It shall be the duty of all city attorneys, peace officers, and other officials having authority under City code Section 1-7 and under the North Carolina General Statutes in enforcement of general criminal laws and City Code violations to take all actions to the extent of their authority,

respectively, that may be necessary or proper for the enforcement of the provisions, standards and orders implemented under this ordinance.

Section 5. Notice Prior to Open Burning.

No person or persons shall conduct any open burning within the city limits of Fayetteville, North Carolina, without first having notified the Fayetteville Fire Department by telephone of such intention to burn, the location of the intended burn and the approximate times the burn will begin and end.

Section 6. Penalty for Violation.

In accordance with City Code Section 1-7(a), a violation of any provision of this Code shall subject the offender to a civil penalty in accordance with the fee schedule adopted by the city council or a criminal penalty as provided by State law; except, that where the General Statutes of North Carolina provide specific remedies for violations of provisions of this Code adopted pursuant to such statutes, such remedies available to the city for enforcement of this Code shall be in addition to the remedies hereinafter stated.

Section 7. Severability.

Should any provision or any part hereof be declared by any Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the same shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the balance of this Ordinance which shall remain in effect.

Section 8. Ordinance Conflict.

Nothing in this section is intended to circumvent, repeal, or otherwise supersede other provisions of this section and other sections of the Fayetteville City Code. To the extent that there is a conflict between the provisions of this section and other sections of the Fayetteville, City Code, the North Carolina General Statutes, the North Carolina Constitution or the Constitution of the United States, those provisions will control.

Section 9. Effective Date.

This resolution shall be effective upon publication as required by statute.

AN ACT TO (1) PROVIDE THAT USES OF RECLAIMED WATER THAT ARE DEEMED TO BE PERMITTED BY REGULATION, WITHOUT THE ISSUANCE OF AN INDIVIDUAL PERMIT OR COVERAGE UNDER A GENERAL PERMIT, INCLUDE IRRIGATION OF ORNAMENTAL CROPS BY FIELD NURSERIES AND ABOVEGROUND CONTAINER NURSERIES AND TO PROVIDE THAT CERTAIN SETBACK REQUIREMENTS AND DESIGN CRITERIA FOR WASTEWATER TREATMENT STORAGE FACILITIES DO NOT APPLY TO ARTIFICIAL LAKES OR PONDS THAT ARE USED FOR STORAGE AND IRRIGATION OF RECLAIMED WATER AS PART OF A CONJUNCTIVE USE RECLAIMED WATER SYSTEM AND (2) AUTHORIZE THE DISPOSAL, TEMPORARY STORAGE, AND BURNING OF STORM-RELATED DEBRIS DURING THE STATE OF EMERGENCY DECLARED ON APRIL 16, 2011, THROUGH JUNE 1, 2011.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

PART I. IMPLEMENTATION OF RECLAIMED WATER RULES.

SECTION 1. Definitions. – The following definitions apply to this section and its implementation:

- (1) The definitions set out in G.S. 143-212 and G.S. 143-213.
- (2) The definitions set out in 15A NCAC 02T .0103 (Waste Not Discharged to Surface Waters: Definitions).
- (3) The definitions set out in 15A NCAC 02U .0103 (Reclaimed Water: Definitions).
- (4) "Permitting by Regulation Rule 15A NCAC 02U .0113" means 15A NCAC 02U .0113 (Permitting by Regulation) as adopted by the Environmental Management Commission on November 18, 2010, and approved by the Rules Review Commission on December 16, 2010.
- (5) "Reclaimed Water Utilization Rule 15A NCAC 02U .0501" means 15A NCAC 02U .0501 (Reclaimed Water Utilization) as adopted by the Environmental Management Commission on November 18, 2010, and approved by the Rules Review Commission on December 16, 2010.

SECTION 2.(a) Permitting by Regulation Rule 15A NCAC 02U .0113. – Until the effective date of the revised permanent rule that the Commission is required to adopt pursuant to Section 2(c) of this act, the Commission and the Department shall implement the Permitting by Regulation Rule 15A NCAC 02U .0113, as provided in Section 2(b) of this act.

SECTION 2.(b) Implementation. – Notwithstanding subsection (a) of Permitting by Regulation Rule 15A NCAC 02U .0113, irrigation of agricultural crops, including irrigation of ornamental crops by field nurseries and aboveground container nurseries, supplied with reclaimed water as part of a conjunctive use reclaimed water system meeting the requirements of 15A NCAC 02U .0401 and approved by the reclaimed water provider is deemed to be permitted pursuant to G.S. 143-215.1(b), and it is not necessary for the Division to issue individual permits or coverage under a general permit for construction or operation of this type of utilization system, provided the system does not result in any violations of surface water or groundwater standards and there is no unpermitted direct discharge to surface waters.

SECTION 2.(c) Additional Rule-Making Authority. – The Commission shall adopt a rule to replace Permitting by Regulation Rule 15A NCAC 02U .0113. Notwithstanding G.S. 150B-19(4),

the rule adopted by the Commission pursuant to this section shall be substantively identical to the provisions of Section 2(b) of this act. Rules adopted pursuant to this section are not subject to G.S. 150B-21.9 through G.S. 150B-21.14. Rules adopted pursuant to this section shall become effective as provided in G.S. 150B-21.3(b1) as though 10 or more written objections had been received as provided by G.S. 150B-21.3(b2).

SECTION 3.(a) Reclaimed Water Utilization Rule 15A NCAC 02U .0501. – Until the effective date of the revised permanent rule that the Commission is required to adopt pursuant to Section 3(c) of this act, the Commission and the Department shall implement the Reclaimed Water Utilization Rule 15A NCAC 02U .0501, as provided in Section 3(b) of this act.

SECTION 3.(b) Implementation. – Notwithstanding subsection (a) of Reclaimed Water Utilization Rule 15A NCAC 02U .0501, existing or proposed artificial lakes or ponds operated by customers of reclaimed water providers may be used for storage and irrigation of reclaimed water as part of a conjunctive use reclaimed water system as provided in this section. Setbacks specified in 15A NCAC 02U .0701(b) between reclaimed water storage ponds and property lines or wells under separate ownership may be waived by the adjoining property owner. A copy of the signed and notarized waiver shall be provided to the Department. Setbacks specified in 15A NCAC 02U .0701(b) between reclaimed water storage ponds and wells under the same ownership as the reclaimed water storage pond may be waived by the property owner. The criteria for liners specified in 15A NCAC 02U .0401(f) are not required, provided the effluent quality of the reclaimed water source is protective of the groundwater standard for nitrates established pursuant to Subchapter 2L of Title 15A of the North Carolina Administrative Code.

SECTION 3.(c) Additional Rule-Making Authority. – The Commission shall adopt a rule to replace Reclaimed Water Utilization Rule 15A NCAC 02U .0501. Notwithstanding G.S. 150B-19 (4), the rule adopted by the Commission pursuant to this section shall be substantively identical to the provisions of Section 3(b) of this act. Rules adopted pursuant to this section are not subject to G.S. 150B-21.9 through G.S. 150B-21.14. Rules adopted pursuant to this section shall become effective as provided in G.S. 150B-21.3(b1) as though 10 or more written objections had been received as provided by G.S. 150B-21.3(b2).

SECTION 4. If a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit is required for storage or irrigation of reclaimed water as part of a conjunctive use reclaimed water system, the Division of Water Quality in the Department of Environment and Natural Resources shall issue general permits for such activities in order to encourage the use of reclaimed water and to minimize the regulatory burden on users of reclaimed water.

PART II. AUTHORIZE EXPEDITED CLEANUP OF STORM-RELATED DEBRIS.

SECTION 5.(a) The following definitions apply to this section and its implementation:

- (1) The definitions set out in G.S. 130A-294.
- (2) The definitions set out in 15A NCAC 02D .0101 (Air Pollution Control Requirements: Definitions and References).
- (3) "Storm-related debris" means any construction or demolition debris, inert debris, land-clearing debris, or yard debris or trash generated in the State as a result of the tornados, flooding, and severe winds that occurred on April 16, 2011.

SECTION 5.(b) From the date that the state of emergency was declared by the Governor under Executive Order No. 87 through June 1, 2011, the disposal, temporary storage, and burning of storm-related debris is allowed, notwithstanding any permitting requirements for the handling or disposal of solid waste, or any prohibitions on open burning related to the protection of air quality provided under State law, including, but not limited, to all of the following:

- (1) G.S. 130A-294 (Solid Waste Management Program) and other provisions of Article 9 of Chapter 130A of the General Statutes as may prohibit the unpermitted disposal, temporary storage, or burning of storm-related debris.
- (2) 15A NCAC 13B .0103 (Solid Waste Management: General Conditions) and 15A NCAC 13B .0201 (Permits for Solid Waste Management Facilities: Permit Required) and other provisions of the North Carolina Administrative Code as may prohibit the unpermitted disposal, temporary storage, or burning of storm-related debris.
- (3) G.S. 143-215.3 (General Powers of Commission and Department; auxiliary powers) and other provisions of Article 21 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes as may

prohibit the unpermitted disposal, temporary storage, or burning of storm-related debris.

(4) 15A NCAC 02D .0305 (Air Pollution Control Requirements: Emission Reduction Plan: Alert Level) and other provisions of the North Carolina Administrative Code as may prohibit the unpermitted disposal, temporary storage, or burning of storm-related debris.

SECTION 5.(c) The provisions of subsection (b) of this section shall not be construed to (i) allow the improper or unpermitted storage, disposal, or burning of hazardous waste; (ii) obviate the need for a permit to burn required under Article 4C of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes for the protection of the public from the hazards of forest fires; (iii) allow any activity that would violate federal law; or (iv) allow any activity that causes an imminent threat to public health or safety.

SECTION 6. This act is effective when it becomes law.

In the General Assembly read three times and ratified this the 20th day of April, 2011.

State Officials Encourage People to Use Caution When Disposing of Storm Debris

RALEIGH - Following the destruction of last weekend's tornadoes, many North Carolina residents are faced with the disposal of storm-related debris. State environmental officials urge landowners to consider personal safety and the environment when choosing disposal options for this debris.

Officials with the N.C. Division of Forest Resources remind landowners who might choose to burn debris that North Carolina's spring wildfire season lasts until mid-May. Local county forest rangers are available to offer technical advice and explain the best options to help landowners maximize the safety to people, property and the forest.

For people who choose to burn debris, the following tips should help protect property and prevent wildfires:

- Make sure you have a valid permit. You can obtain a burning permit at any NCDFR office or permitting agent or online at <http://dfr.nc.gov>.
- Check with local officials - outside burning may be prohibited, or may only be permitted during specified hours.
- Check the weather - don't burn on dry, windy days.
- Homeowners can burn yard trimmings - excluding stumps and logs more than six inches in diameter - if it's allowed under local ordinances, no public pickup is available and it doesn't cause a public nuisance.
- Local fire officials can recommend a safe way for burning debris. Don't pile it on the ground, it should be placed in a cleared area, away from overhead branches and wires in a screened receptacle.
- Debris should not be accumulated for several days and then ignited. It becomes compacted and wet, increasing the air pollution, and makes the fire burn longer, requiring more watching.
- Consider the alternatives to burning. Some types of debris, such as leaves, grass and stubble, may be of more value if they are not burned.
- Be sure you are fully prepared before burning. To control the fire you will need a hose, bucket and a shovel for tossing dirt on the fire.
- Never use kerosene, gasoline, diesel fuel or other flammable liquids to speed debris burning.
- Stay with your fire until it is completely out.
- Avoid initiating a burn when the forecast includes an Air Quality Action Day Code "Orange" or above.

Studies have shown that taking these and other measures can greatly reduce wildfires and the loss of property associated with them.

Limit open burning as much as possible because the smoke from outdoor fires can cause serious health problems and pollute the air. For example, a study by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency found that backyard burning of trash from a family of four can emit as much of some pollutants, such as dioxin and furan, as a well-controlled municipal incinerator serving tens of thousands of households. In particular, health hazards arise from burning: demolition debris and building materials, including lumber; asphalt shingles and heavy oils; wire, plastics and other synthetic materials; garbage, paper and cardboard; tires and other rubber products; paints, and household and agricultural chemicals.

Please keep in mind that improper or unpermitted storage, disposal or burning of hazardous waste is strictly prohibited. Some of the most common hazardous wastes are:

- Batteries, such as nickel-cadmium (Ni-Cd) and small sealed lead-acid batteries, which are found in many common items, including electronic equipment, cell phones, portable computers, and emergency backup lighting.
- Agricultural pesticides that have been recalled or banned from use, are obsolete, have become damaged, or are no longer needed due to changes in cropping patterns or other factors. They often are stored for long periods of time in sheds or barns.
- Thermostats, which can contain as much as 3 grams of liquid mercury and are located in almost any building, including commercial, industrial, agricultural, community and household buildings.
- Lamps, which typically contain mercury and sometimes lead, and are found in businesses and households. Examples include fluorescent, high-intensity discharge (HID), neon, mercury vapor, high-pressure sodium and metal halide lamps.
- Used oil.
- Scrap metal.
- Electronic waste such as cathode ray tubes contained in computer monitors and televisions.
- Lead-based paint.

DEBRIS DISPOSAL GUIDANCE (RELATED TO 4/16/2011 STORMS)

Pick-up and Disposal

The best way to dispose of most storm debris – especially debris from damaged mobile homes, houses and other buildings – is to rely on your city or county's waste disposal services. In areas with significant damage, local governments are providing special instructions on how to get the debris to approved disposal areas. In many areas, state and local agencies are working together to provide roadside pick-up. Using local government pickup and disposal services will ensure that waste material gets disposed of properly. If you have questions about pick-up and disposal of storm debris, contact your local solid waste department or emergency management officials.

Burning

If you choose to burn debris, you need to do at least two things to be sure that you are doing it legally:

- Make sure you have a valid permit. You can obtain a burning permit at any N.C. Division of Forest Resources office or permitting agent or online at <http://dfr.state.nc>.
- Check on local open burning restrictions established by your county or city- outside burning may be prohibited, or may only be permitted during specified hours.

Limit open burning as much as possible because the smoke from outdoor fires can cause serious health problems. Some state rules limiting the kinds of materials that can be burned outdoors have been lifted until June 1, 2011, but it is still wise to avoid burning materials that can be toxic such as: building materials; asphalt shingles; heavy oils; wire, plastics and other synthetic materials; tires and other rubber products; paints, and household and agricultural chemicals. Note: After June 1, 2011, open burning will again be limited to vegetation such as leaves and tree branches.

Burning of hazardous waste is strictly prohibited. Some of the most common hazardous wastes are:

- Batteries, such as nickel-cadmium (Ni-Cd) and small sealed lead-acid batteries, which are found in many common items, including electronic equipment, cell phones, portable computers, and emergency backup lighting.
- Agricultural pesticides.
- Thermostats, which can contain as much as 3 grams of liquid mercury and are located in almost any building, including commercial, industrial, agricultural, community and household buildings.
- Lamps, which typically contain mercury and sometimes lead, and are found in businesses and households. Examples include fluorescent, high-intensity discharge (HID), neon, mercury vapor, high-pressure sodium and metal halide lamps.
- Used oil.
- Scrap metal.
- Electronic waste such as cathode ray tubes contained in computer monitors and televisions.

Burial of Debris

Federal law prohibits the open dumping of waste, including construction debris. To avoid violating federal law, waste disposal has to meet a number of standards intended to prevent groundwater contamination; pollution of rivers and streams; obstruction of floodplains; and other problems. To safely and lawfully bury waste on your property, you must give careful attention to both the kinds of waste and the place chosen for disposal. A permitted local landfill or approved disposal site will meet those federal standards.

Storage and disposal of hazardous waste is more strictly regulated. Examples of hazardous waste are listed above under the section on burning. Hazardous waste

cannot be burned. The best way to dispose of hazardous waste is to follow instructions for disposal provided by your local government.
