



THE MURCHISON CN PLAN PROCESS

COMPREHENSIVE AND COLLABORATIVE
WAY.

The City, FMHA, and its strong group of partners have utilized unique and effective outreach techniques and activities supplemented by online interactive tools and social media to keep residents engaged throughout the process. Because of constraints due to COVID-19, our engagement approach has been tailored to the current situation and was adaptable over time to ensure that all voices are heard.

Multiple forms of communication have been utilized to reach FMHA residents. A project website has been established to document the planning process and provide easy access to information. Flyers and notices have been distributed before meetings through our Community Ambassadors. Residents have been engaged at key points in the planning process. Initial public housing resident meetings early in the planning process have helped to strengthen trust and instill confidence so that FMHA residents can successfully engage with the larger community. The Planning Team has also engaged local youth to document their preferences for projects and programs that will directly benefit themselves and their peers.

WHEN RESIDENTS ARE GENUINELY AT THE CENTER OF A PLANNING PROCESS, A UNIQUE OUTCOME UNFOLDS.

Relationships become the focal point of the work. This is because for Murchison Neighborhood residents, planning is personal – it's about their children, their families, their homes, their neighbors, and their streets. It is about making their day-to-day lives better in real-time. As we worked together to envision, design, and implement the investment and physical changes necessary to revitalize the Murchison Neighborhood, it has been critical that residents are engaged from day one, so that they can help to assume a leadership role in the process. An indicator of the level of genuine engagement achieved is the establishment of trust.

Relationships are the currency of collective impact, and the ability to achieve lasting results. A denser network of relationships produces a wider array of possibilities, a more robust set of potential opportunities, and a larger implementation ripple effect.

ABOUT

In December of 2020, the City of Fayetteville, in partnership with the Fayetteville Metropolitan Housing Authority (FMHA), was awarded a HUD Choice Neighborhoods Planning Grant for the Murchison neighborhood. Through the Grant, the City and FMHA are working with local residents and a variety of community stakeholders – including nonprofits, faith-based organizations, anchor institutions, supportive services agencies, businesses, and others – to create a forward-looking Transformation Plan with a strong commitment to diversity and inclusion.

The Plan will be centered on redevelopment of FMHA's Murchison Townhouses, which includes 60 units of low-income housing. The CNI Plan will seek to replace 100% of those housing units within the neighborhood, or in other areas of opportunity as part of new mixed-income developments.

ONLINE MEETINGS

Due to COVID-19, our process has been designed for full flexibility in outreach methods to ensure active participation regardless of the current circumstances. Throughout 2021 and into 2022, online meetings were a useful tool to ensure that the Steering Committee, Advisory Groups, local partners, and the community as a whole were able to continue to provide feedback and ideas from the comfort of their home or office.



MURCHISON CN VIDEOS

To provide an easy-to-understand summary of the Choice Neighborhood goals and process, as well as a document of engagement activities, a series of videos were produced and hosted on the project website. The videos were often distributed to residents and partners to help brief them on the status of the planning effort. AS OF MARCH 2023, MURCHISONCHOICE.COM HAS HAD OVER 4,200 UNIQUE VISITORS!



COMMUNITY MEETINGS

In addition to online meetings and smaller gatherings, we have held four larger in-person Community Meetings at various stages of the process. These meetings provided the opportunity for face-to-face conversations and hands-on activities related to identifying assets, challenges, and opportunities, and prioritizing projects and strategies.









STEERING COMMITTEE

We organized a CN Steering Committee, with membership representing the full cross-section of both neighborhood and citywide partners. The Steering Committee was comprised of City representatives, FMHA leadership, target housing residents, representatives of neighborhood organizations, institutional partners, nearby churches, businesses/employers, key service providers, potential funders, and other planning partners. The Committee has served as a sounding board for the project Planning Team and will allow for frequent and focused discussions with a smaller group of stakeholders.

ADVISORY GROUPS

The Fayetteville Redevelopment Commission and the Pathway to Prosperity Coalition have served as Advisory Groups for the process. The Planning Team met with each group on a monthly basis to discuss project updates, and to elicit feedback relating to the Plan.





WORKING GROUPS

Five Working Groups were organized around the topics of History, Equity and Inclusion, Housing and Commercial Development, Education and Job Training, Safety and Security, and Transportation and Open Space. A total of 230 residents and stakeholders participated in Working Group Meetings between January and March 2022. These conversations were essential to brainstorming and ranking project strategies, as well as identifying potential resources, and partners for implementation.
