



(Petition-Initiated Contiguous Area)

A public hearing has been scheduled for March 16, 1992, concerning the proposed petition-initiated annexation of Skibo Square. (See Map A and Map B attached.) The Notice of Public Hearing was published in the March 6, 1992, edition of The Fayetteville Observer-Times.

After holding the public hearing, the City Council has the authority to adopt an ordinance annexing the area. The City Council has the authority to make the ordinance effective immediately or on any specified date within six months from the date of passage of the ordinance.

In deciding on whether to annex or not to annex this area, the City Councilmembers might want to consider a variety of information. The overall purpose of this memo is to present this information to the City Council.

The memo is organized as follows:

- Section A provides basic information about the area proposed for annexation.
- Section B evaluates the area in terms of several criteria.
- Section C provides a summary, conclusions, and recommendations.

BASIC INFORMATION ABOUT THE AREA PROPOSED FOR ANNEXATION

- 1. NAME OF AREA: Skibo Square
- 2. TYPE OF PROPOSED ANNEXATION: Petition Initiated (Contiguous Area)
- 3. CONTEXT/BACKGROUND: On February 5, 1992, the City received an annexation petition, requesting annexation of property to be developed as a new commercial area to be known as Skibo Square. A new K-MART and Lowe's will be built on the site.

The petition was signed by the following seven (7) individuals: J.P. Riddle; March F. Riddle; Carolyn R. Armstrong; George Armstrong; Sharlene R. Williams; Robert J. Williams, IV; and Joseph P. Riddle, III. In addition, the petition was signed by officers of Skibo Square, Inc. (Joseph P. Riddle, III, President, and Sharlene R. Williams, Secretary).

The petition was presented to the City Council on February 18. On March 2, the City Council set a public hearing date for March 16.

- 4. <u>LOCATION</u>: The proposed annexation area is located on the eastern side of Skibo Road (U.S. 401 Bypass), south of Campground Road and north of the Colonial Storage Center. (See Map A and Map B.) The proposed area is contiguous to the City.
- 5. REASON FOR THE PETITION: Water and/or sewer main extensions will be needed to serve the proposed development. Therefore, the developer has requested that PWC utility extensions be made.

There is a policy which states that property owners/developers requesting water and sanitary sewer extensions to areas immediately adjacent or contiguous to the City must file a petition for annexation as a prerequisite to utility extensions. The City Council has the freedom to approve or reject the petition. The purpose of the policy is to enable the City to enforce City development standards on developing property contiguous to the City. Pursuant to this policy, the owners have submitted a petition for annexation.

- f. Present Ad Valorem Tax Value The present ad valorem tax value of the area (before revaluation) is estimated as \$19,277. Ad valorem tax revenues for the remainder of FY 91-92 would be based on this value. The components of this value are shown below.

9. FACTORS AFFECTING EXPECTED FUTURE CONDITIONS:

 a. <u>Plans of Owners</u> - The owner/developer (Skibo Square, Inc.) plans to develop the property as commercial.

b. <u>Development Controls</u>

(1) Zoning

(a) <u>Current Zoning in County</u> - C(P) on northern four-fifths of property; M(P) on southern one-fifth.

Timing Issue: The developer has already started construction on the Lowe's building on the northern side of property. The developer has not yet started construction on the K-MART building, which is proposed for the southern side of the property. The southern side of the property is zoned both C(P) and M(P) in the County. In order for construction to begin on the K-MART in the County, the M(P) portion needs to be rezoned to C(P). developer has indicated that this "zoning problem" slowed down the beginning of construction of the K-MART.

(b) Likely Future Zoning After Annexation — After annexation, it is anticipated that the entire property could be initially zoned as C1(P) in the City. The portion currently zoned as M(P) in the County could be initially zoned as C1(P), since the City's zoning districts are cumulative and since C1(P) is "more restrictive than" the City's industrial zoning districts.

Timing Issue: On March 2, the Planning Board staff provided a calendar of events which was designed to initially zone the Skibo Square property as quickly as possible. According to this calendar, there would be a Planning Board public hearing on April 7 and a City Council public hearing on April 20.

(2) Site Plan Approval Process

- (a) County Process The Skibo Square project has already received preliminary site plan approval under the County process, according to the Planning Board staff. This raises the question of whether the developer has vested rights to proceed.
- (b) City Process Because it is possible that the area will be annexed as soon as March 16 and because the developer has expressed a desire to start the K-MART building as soon as possible after annexation, the City staff has encouraged the developer to submit to the Planning Board staff a request for site plan approval under the City process. As of March 6, the developer had not submitted such a request.

(3) Land Use Plans

(a) <u>Current Plan (1971)</u> - Medium density residential and industrial

10. EXPECTED FUTURE CONDITIONS:

a. Future Use of Land

- (1) Residential None
- (2) Non-residential Commercial. The proposed annexation area is currently divided into four parcels. Each is discussed below. (See Map B for location of parcels.)

<u>Parcel 1</u> - (10.91 acres) A Lowe's store is proposed for this parcel. According to the developer's staff, the Lowe's building will be 102,000 square feet in size, it will be one story high, it will be unprotected-sprinklered, and steel frame and masonry will be used in its construction. <u>The developer has already received a building permit from the County for the Lowe's building</u>. Construction is already underway. It is expected that Lowe's will open on November 1.

<u>Parcel 2</u> - (11.83 acres) A K-MART is proposed for this parcel. According to the developer's staff, this building will be about 112,000 square feet in size, it will be one story high, it will be unprotected-sprinklered, and steel frame and masonry will be used in its construction. The builder has not yet received a building permit from the County for K-MART building. Construction is not yet underway. The developer hopes that the K-MART will open by November 1.

<u>Parcel 3</u> - (1.79 acres) The future use of this commercial out-parcel is not known at this time.

<u>Parcel 4</u> - (2.14 acres) The future use of this commercial out-parcel is not known at this time.

- b. Future Number of Housing Units 0
- c. Future Demographics No population.
- d. Future Streets One new street (an extension of Campground Road) is now under construction and is expected to be completed by October 1, 1992. The approximate length of this street is 900 feet. The developer has submitted street and drainage plans for the street to the City staff, even though the street is not yet in the City. The street is being built to NCDOT Thoroughfare Standards, which exceed the City's standards for this type of street. The street will be eight lanes wide at its entrance with Skibo Road, and five lanes wide beyond the entrance. It is likely that the street will be accepted by the City for maintenance effective 7-1-93.
- e. <u>Future Utilities</u> When development is completed, this area will have the full range of PWC utilities (sewer, water, fire hydrants, electricity, street lights).

f. Future Ad Valorem Tax Value - When the Lowe's and K-MART stores are completed, it can be projected that the future total ad valorem tax value will be at least \$8,935,545. (This will increase when information about the value of business equipment and fixtures becomes available.) It is expected that these values will be in effect by 1-1-93, so the FY 93-94 ad valorem tax revenues will be based on these values. Subsequent fiscal year revenues would also be based on these values. (If the two out-parcels are developed, the values would increase accordingly.) The combined components of the projected values for Lowe's and K-MART are shown below.

SECTION B

EVALUATION OF THE AREA PROPOSED FOR ANNEXATION

Through a staff review process, the City staff and the PWC staff have analyzed the proposed annexation in terms of the following criteria:

- 1. Compliance With Statutory Standards
- 2. Ability of City Operating Departments and PWC to Provide Services
- 3. Fiscal Impact (A Comparison of the Projected Costs of Providing Services With the Project Revenues)
- 4. Impact at Time of Annexation on Minority Population Percentages (In Overall City and in Adjacent City Council Districts)
- 5. Other Impacts/Problems Identified in Staff Reviews
- 6. Other Issues Raised in Staff Review

Information about each of these criteria is presented below.

1. COMPLIANCE WITH STATUTORY STANDARDS

G.S. 160A-31 sets forth one standard which an area must meet when it is annexed by petition. The one standard is that the area must be contiguous to the municipal boundary. The proposed annexation area is contiguous to the municipal boundary.

2. ABILITY OF CITY OPERATING DEPARTMENTS AND PWC TO PROVIDE SERVICES

- a. Methodology The head of each City operating department and the PWC Manager were asked to review the proposed area in terms of how their departments would serve this area.
- b. <u>Findings</u> Based on responses received from the City operating departments and from PWC, all operating departments and PWC appear capable of serving the area, if it is annexed.

3. FISCAL IMPACT

Fiscal impact analysis involves comparing the projected costs of providing services with the projected revenues. This technique is useful in evaluating proposed annexations. The results of the analysis for the Skibo Square property are presented below. The City and PWC are treated separately.

a. City - Fiscal Impact

- (1) <u>Procedure</u> Several steps were involved in analyzing the fiscal impact of the proposed annexation on the City.
 - (a) Revenues First, annual operating revenues were projected. Since this area involves no population, revenues were projected for only ad valorem taxes and Powell Bill. (See Worksheet, Appendix A.) Some of the major assumptions were: that the annexation would be effective 3-16-92, leaving only three months in FY 91-92; that the ad valorem land values will lose their eligibility for the "present use program" effective 1-1-92; that the two stores will be completed and open for business by 1-1-93; that 1992 revaluation values can be used for FY 92-93 and subsequent fiscal years; that the City tax rate will remain the same; and that there will be no inflation.
 - Costs Next, annual costs were projected based on the costs specified by department heads in the review process. only cost reported was for street maintenance. Street maintenance costs will be about \$403 per year, beginning in FY 93-94 (.17 mile of Campground Road times \$2,370 per The Engineering Department pointed out that Campground Road might need to be resurfaced in about 10 to 15 years. However, it is not possible to specify these costs at this time. Although there will be annual costs for providing fire protection, police protection, engineering review and permit services, inspection services, and traffic services, these departments did not specify these costs. (In most cases, the departments stated that they could absorb the area with no cost.) It should be noted that there will be no costs for rural fire department debt assumption, because the Bonnie Doone Fire Department has that it is not interested in receiving any reimbursements for this area, if it is annexed.

(c) Results - The results are shown in the table below for five fiscal years. The results should be used with some caution because the operating departments did not quantify all of their costs (e.g., fuel costs). Also, the ad valorem revenues are based on the assumption that the City tax rate will remain the same each year.

b. PWC - Fiscal Impact

- (1) <u>Procedure</u> Several steps were involved in analyzing the fiscal impacts of the proposed annexation on PWC.
 - (a) Revenues First, revenues to PWC were considered. It is not anticipated that PWC will receive any additional revenues as a direct result of annexing the area. Although PWC will gain at least two fairly large utility customers (Lowe's and K-MART) as this area develops, this gain in customers cannot be attributed to annexation.
 - (b) Costs Next, costs to PWC were projected. In FY 91-92, PWC would incur a cost in the form of a refund to the developer (assuming an effective date of annexation of 3-16-92). refund would be based on one-third of the cost to the developer of extending water and sewer lines. According to PWC, the refund would be \$30,233.15. It is assumed that PWC's cost of providing water and treating sewer will be offset by rates received. Another cost for PWC which can be attributed to annexation is the cost of street lights. (Street lights would not be installed if the area were not annexed.) According to PWC, 14 street lights will be needed, at a cost of \$5,000. The PWC Electrical Division is currently designing electrical facilities to serve the area; these will be installed in the near future. overhead circuit will be relocated due to the construction of a turning lane. However, the cost of these activities should not be attributed to annexation. Since there are no active accounts in the area, there would be no "costs" to PWC in terms of reduction in water rates or elimination of street light surcharges.
- (2) Results Revenues and costs were discussed above. It is not necessary to present these revenues and costs in a table (as was done for the City fiscal impact analysis).

4. IMPACT AT TIME OF ANNEXATION ON MINORITY POPULATION PERCENTAGES (IN OVERALL CITY AND IN ADJACENT DISTRICTS)

As shown in Section A of this memo (Item 8 - Present Conditions), this area presently has zero housing units and zero population. It is assumed that these conditions will not change between now and the assumed effective date of annexation (3-16-92). Therefore, there will be no impact at the time of annexation on minority population percentages, either at the overall City level or at the district level. (This area is adjacent to City Council Election District #5 - Old District #5 and new District #5.)

5. OTHER IMPACTS/PROBLEMS IDENTIFIED IN STAFF REVIEW

a. Methodology - During staff review, the head of each City operating department and the PWC Manager were asked to identify any additional impacts/problems, if the area were annexed. It was suggested that the cumulative impact of other annexations enacted during the previous two fiscal years be considered.

b. Findings

- (1) PWC Impacts/Problems None identified.
- (2) City Operating Departments Impacts/Problems:
 - (a) Engineering Department The Acting City Engineer pointed out that the proposed street and parking lot of this development will cause an increase in the amount of stormwater runoff into the downstream area beyond the limits of this development. Therefore, Buckhead Creek should probably be monitored to determine if any erosion or other problems have occurred after heavy storms.

6. OTHER ISSUES RAISED IN STAFF REVIEW

a. Methodology - During staff review, the head of each City operating department and the PWC Manager were asked whether the consideration of this proposed annexation raised any other issues which need to be addressed.

b. Findings

- (1) PWC Other Issues Raised None raised.
- (2) City Operating Departments Other Issues Raised:
 - (a) Traffic Services The City Traffic Engineer has projected that this project will generate 18,000 trips per day. (About 60 percent of these trips will be "new trips"; the remaining 40 percent of trips will be pass-by trips from existing traffic.) The additional traffic will contribute to more congestion in the area. In order to manage this traffic congestion, the developer should be encouraged to extend the proposed extension of Campground Road further, so

that it connects with an existing stub-out on Morganton Road beside Bullard Furniture. Also, development plans need to respect the corridor for a proposed thoroughfare which is expected to be built between Cliffdale Road and Morganton Road.

SECTION C

SUMMARY, CONCLUSIONS, AND RECOMMENDATIONS

In summary, this memo has analyzed the proposed petition-initiated annexation of Skibo Square. The memo has provided basic information about the area, with a focus on present conditions and expected future conditions. The memo has also evaluated the area in terms of several criteria.

The basic conclusions are as follows:

- The area does comply with statutory standards, since the area is contiguous.
- The City operating departments and PWC appear to be able to provide services to the area.
- The fiscal impact of annexing the area appears to be very positive for the City. However, City departments did not quantify all of their costs. The fiscal impact analysis for PWC needs to be refined before conclusions can be drawn.
- If the area is annexed effective 3-16-92, there will be no impact on minority population percentages.

Based on these conclusions, the City staff recommends that the City Council annex the area. The City staff also recommends that the annexation be made effective on the date of adoption of the ordinance (e.g., March 16, 1992). By making the ordinance effective March 16, the City (rather than the County) might be able to issue the building permit for the K-MART building. If the City issues the building permit, there would be additional revenues to the City.

In addition to these recommendations concerning annexation, the City staff also offers the following recommendations:

- Potential stormwater runoff needs to be monitored.
- The proposed development will contribute to additional traffic congestion in the area. Therefore, the developer should be encouraged to extend Campground Road to Morganton Road and to protect the proposed thoroughfare corridor which is located to the rear of the annexation area.





AN ORDINANCE TO EXTEND THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FAYETTEVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA

WHEREAS, the City Council has been petitioned under G.S. 160A-31, as amended, to annex the area described herein; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has by resolution directed the City Clerk to investigate the sufficiency of said petition; and

WHEREAS, the City Clerk has certified the sufficiency of said petition and a public hearing on the question of this annexation was held at City Hall Council Chambers at 7 o'clock, p.m., on the 16th day of March, 1992, after due notice by publication on the 6th day of March, 1992; and

WHEREAS, the City Council does hereby find as a fact that said petition meets the requirements of G.S. 160A-31, as amended;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Fayetteville, North Carolina:

Section 1. By virtue of the authority granted by G.S. 160A-31, as amended, the following described territory, is hereby annexed and made part of the City of Fayetteville as of the 16th day of March, 1992.

BEGINNING at a point in the City Limit Line, established by Annexation 86-7-297, dated July 21, said point being the intersection of the eastern right-of-way margin of U.S. 401 Bypass (Skibo Road) and the northern tangent line of a curve to the left on to Campground Road, shown in Plat Book 59, Page 119, Cumberland County Registry, and running thence with the City Limit Line for the following listed calls: South 74 degrees 05 minutes 45 seconds East 75.0 feet; a curve to the right in a southeast direction with a radius of 263.91 feet and an arc distance of 144.56 feet to a point in said margin; South 74 degrees 05 minutes 40 seconds East 362.50 feet; South 82 degrees 28 minutes 43 seconds East 491.16 feet; thence leaving the City Limit Line and running South 07 degrees 23 minutes 38 seconds West about 90.5 feet to an iron stake in the southern right-of-way margin of Campground Road as drawn on a survey of Skibo Square and recorded in Plat Book 78, Page 74, Cumberland County Registry; thence with the southern right-of-way margin of said street South 78

degrees 08 minutes 11 seconds West 34.88 feet to a point; thence leaving the street margin and running South 15 degrees 45 minutes 15 seconds West feet to a point; thence South 49 degrees 33 minutes 21 seconds East 123.87 feet to a point; thence South 03 degrees 28 minutes 50 seconds East 90.00 feet to a point; thence South 15 degrees 45 minutes 15 seconds West 167.86 feet to a point; thence South 62 degrees 25 minutes 47 seconds West 166.15 feet to a point; thence South 15 degrees 45 minutes 15 seconds West 354.33 feet to the southeast corner of a Survey Plat of Skibo Square as shown in Plat Book 78, Page 74, Cumberland County Registry; thence North 74 degrees 14 minutes 45 seconds West 484.46 feet to a point in eastern property line of Colonial the Storage Centers, I, Inc.; thence running along the eastern property line of said property North 15 degrees 51 minutes 52 seconds East 139.95 feet to a point; thence North 74 degrees 05 minutes 08 seconds West 313.34 feet to a point; thence South 15 degrees 50 minutes 38 seconds West 175.08 feet to a point; thence North 74 degrees 09 minutes 24 seconds West 268.51 feet to a point in the eastern right-of-way margin of U.S. 401 Bypass (Skibo Road); thence running along the new right-of-way margin of Skibo Road North 19 degrees 34 minutes 13 seconds East 180.00 feet to a point; thence North 15 degrees 45 minutes 15 seconds East about 183 feet to a point; thence North 74 degrees 03 minutes 36 seconds West 12.0 feet to the old right-of-way margin of Skibo Road and southeast corner of the existing City Limit Line, established by Annexation 90-11-337, dated November 19, 1990; thence with the City Limit Line North 15 degrees 56 minutes 24 seconds East 205.0 feet to a corner of the existing City Limit Line established by Annexation 85-2-293, dated February 4, 1985; thence with said eastern line North 15 degrees 56 minutes 24 seconds East 662.76 feet to a point; feet to the thence northeastward about 105.6 BEGINNING . . . containing 29.63 acres, more or less.

Section 2. Upon and after the 16th day of March, 1992, the above described territory and its citizens and property shall be subject to all debts, laws, ordinances, and regulations in force in the City of Fayetteville and shall be entitled to the same privileges and benefits as other parts of the City of Fayetteville. Said territory shall be subject to municipal taxes according to G.S. 160A-58.10.

Section 3. The Mayor of the City of Fayetteville shall cause to be recorded in the Office of the Register of Deeds of Cumberland County, and in the Office of the Secretary of State at Raleigh, North Carolina, an accurate map of the annexed territory, described in Section 1 hereof, together with a duly

certified copy of this ordinance. The Mayor of the City of Fayetteville shall also cause such map and ordinance to be filed with the County Board of Elections of Cumberland County.

Mr. Jim Konneker, Chairman of the Metro Visions committee, requests to be placed on the agenda for the March 16, 1992, meeting of the Fayetteville City Council. SUBJECT: Rollout Disposal Fee

The City Council at its October 7, 1991, meeting established the rate of \$50.00 per rollout to recoup the disposal fee charged by the County on those rollouts not covered on their individual property tax bill. The purpose of the fee is to have these customers pay for their disposal cost just as all other customers within the City pay for their disposal cost.

Since October the City has been reviewing the amount of disposal cost charged by the County, the number of rollouts used by businesses, the number of rollouts used by mobile home parks and apartments, the weight of the garbage and the \$25.00 fee charged by the County for households. Considering all those issues, along with the equity and fairness of the fee, I suggest the disposal fee for apartments and mobile homes be reduced from \$50.00 to \$25.00. My recommendation is based on the following:

> Estimated 1,700 rollouts utilized by apartments and mobile home parks 1,700 rollouts x \$25.00 fee = \$42,500Estimated 700 rollouts utilized by businesses 700 rollouts x \$50.00 fee 35,000 \$77,500 \$77,000 Estimated annual cost for disposal 500 NET

Another consideration, in addition to the proposed fee, is to waive the disposal fee for FY 1991-92 in exchange for all customers switching to dumpsters effective July 1, 1992, and returning all rollout carts to the City. This would be a fair trade-off since the City could reduce the number of rollout carts purchased for FY 1992-93.

Councilmember Robertson has inquired reference status of traffic signal request at Raeford Road and Executive Place.

We advised NCDOT in March 1990 of our traffic signal investigation and City Council's request that NCDOT consider installing a traffic signal at this intersection.

North Carolina Department of Transportation replied in June 1990 that although traffic conditions meet several of the Manual on Traffic Control Devices warrants for a traffic signal, they could not recommend a signal because Executive Place is located between traffic signals at Purdue Street and McPhee Drive which should afford adequate gaps in Raeford Road traffic for egress from Executive Place. In addition, traffic on Executive Place can detour via McGill Drive to the signalized intersection at McPhee Drive and Raeford Road.

We are enclosing a copy of NCDOT's reply for your information.

This is in further regard to your request that we conduct a traffic signal warrant study at the intersection of US 401 Bus. (Raeford Road) and Executive Place. Our staff has recently completed a traffic engineering investigation at this location.

Justification for signals is based on warrants contained in the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) published by the Federal Highway Administration. These warrants are based on traffic volume, correctable accident experience and physical characteristics of the intersection. Conditions at the subject intersection were compared against these warrants.

An analysis of the traffic counts taken at this intersection on 4/3/90 indicated that several volume warrants have been met (# 2, 9, and 11). However, we do not feel that a traffic signal should be installed at this intersection for the following reasons:

1. US 401 Bus. is a major arterial serving over 25,000 vehicles daily. With the main street traffic volume this high, there are probably many other side streets similar to Executive Place with an entering traffic volume high enough to meet one or more of the volume warrants. It would not be practical to install a signal at each of these locations.

- 2. Executive Place is located about midway between two signalized intersections, US 401 Bus. at Purdue Street and US 401 Bus. at McPhee Street. The spacing of these signals should provide adequate gaps for motorists to egress safely onto US 401 Bus.
- 3. A couple of years ago, the island on US 401 Bus. was removed and the six existing lanes were narrowed up to provide a shared left turn lane. The center turn lane provides safe storage for vehicles waiting to turn off US 401 Bus. onto the side streets. This treatment has reduced the accident frequency.
- 4. Adequate sight distance exists at the intersection to provide safe ingress and egress onto US 401 Bus., if motorists practice safe driving habits.
- 5. A review of the accident history from 12/31/86 through 1/1/90 indicated that eight (8) accidents had occurred at this intersection. Only four (4) of these may be considered correctable by a traffic signal. This falls far below the fifteen (15) correctable accidents required by the MUTCD. Also, compared with accident histories at other intersections along Raeford Road, this is a very low accident frequency.
- 6. Contrary to popular belief, a traffic signal does not always decrease the accident problems at an intersection. Certain types of accidents may be reduced by installing a traffic signal but other types may be increased. Very often the installation of a signal results in the rear-end and sideswipe accident rate increase because more motorists are required to stop at an intersection. Because of this, we feel that installing a traffic signal at an intersection with such a low frequency would only increase the accident potential. Therefore, we do not recommend that a signal be installed at this time.

A field investigation was made to see if any geometric or traffic control modifications could be made to improve driving conditions at the subject intersection. US 401 Bus. westbound has an exclusive right turn lane and short taper. The existing through-right combination arrow painted in this lane should be revised to an exclusive right turn arrow to discourage motorists from using it as a through lane. will have this work completed as soon as our schedule permits.

US 401 Bus. was recently restriped and the pavement marking arrows repainted. All other signing and traffic control devices are in good condition.

Executive Place is striped with an exclusive right turn lane and a 175 foot full left turn lane. This allows right turning motorists to egress more readily and reduces congestion at the intersection.

While making the investigation, we discovered that McGil Drive is a connector between Executive Place and McPhee Street. This provides direct access to the intersection of US 401 Bus. and McPhee Street, which has traffic signal protection. Motorists should be encouraged to use this route to access onto US 401.

Considering the above facts, we do not recommend that a traffic signal be installed at this intersection at this If we may be of any further assistance in this or any other traffic related matter, please advise.

Councilmember Kendricks has requested a review of experience at Owen Drive and the All American Expressway, especially in regard to nighttime accidents and the need for roadway lighting improvements.

A review of our 1990 Accident Investigation Listing reveals that this intersection has both an average accident frequency and severity index - indicating that based on traffic volumes and accident experience throughout the city, accidents are at an expected frequency. Nighttime conditions account for 23% of the accidents at this location between 1988 and 1991. The nighttime accident rate at this intersection is below the average of our 1990 Accident Investigation Listing.

Our proposed 1992 - 1993 Street Lighting Improvement Program. includes areas in need of both crime and nighttime accident reduction. Of the 12 locations on this program, Bragg Boulevard and Hay Street is the ONLY intersection related improvement. nighttime accident rate at Bragg Boulevard and Hay Street is 5 times greater than that at Owen Drive and the All American Expressway. Since the nighttime accident experience at Owen Drive and All American Expressway is below the citywide average, it could be many years before an intersection lighting improvement could advance on a priority listing.

A review of area street lighting does raise a policy issue that City Council may wish to raise with the Public Works Commission. That issue being the lack of roadway lighting on freeways within the city. Neither the All American Expressway nor the CBD Loop have roadway lighting. The lack of roadway lighting on Owen Drive may contribute to nighttime vehicle accidents as motorists travel from Owen Drive with roadway lighting to the unlighted All American Expressway. These freeways would both be good candidates for high mast roadway lighting in conformance with Illumination Engineering Society Standards adopted by Public Works Commission and the City Council.

We are very grateful and appreciative of the opportunity of meeting with Roger Stancil and Jimmy Teal this past Friday and discussing in some detail the results of the various Proposals received by the City for the collection, transportation and disposal of commercial solid waste. We genuinely regret you were unable to join us in our discussions of the practicality of making an award to ARS inasmuch as we provided the lowest and best bid meeting 100% of your I honestly believe all of us involved in the discussions are sensitive to and cognizant of the concerns of the solid waste commercial user's committee, the commercial taxpayers in general and most assuredly, the Council members of the City of Fayetteville.

Through our individual discussions and review with City leaders over the past several weeks, we are sincerely convinced that ARS can offer the City of Fayetteville the most competitive pricing and superior service for the entire commercial constituency while allowing the city the options of (1) subsidizing collection services; (2) having individual commercial users being responsible for their own payment for services directly; and (3) providing for future pricing competitiveness inasmuch as all qualified and interested solid waste service firms will be encouraged to bid for the entire service area at the expiration of the Contract term.

The recent Proposal (RFP) received by the City of Fayetteville granted all of the solid waste management firms the same opportunity to provide their best pricing, their best alternatives, the proof of their experience and expertise and other advantages. As we are confident you are aware, ARS did not take this opportunity lightly. We most assuredly put everything we had into our Proposal and we feel comfortable that while our pricing structure absolutely was the best provided, the balance of our



Proposal also indicated ARS submitted the superior service level, backup support and alternate considerations and other benefits in the total evaluation of the other firms submitting Proposals for consideration by the City.

During our discussions this past Friday, we outlined why we believe each of the City's goals can best be achieved by allowing one vender to provide the solid waste collection services outlined in the City's RFP. The City can discontinue the subsidy of the commercial collection costs and ARS will do the invoicing and collection for the services provided. Under either scenario, the commercial establishment is guaranteed the pricing benefits that were provided in the RFP due to the "economy of scale pricing" by ARS as the firm which provided the significantly lowest price. The City of Fayetteville will still maintain "control" and will have an experienced and proven quality-oriented local firm to provide a consistent and uninterrupted level of solid waste management service. Perhaps more importantly, your City's elected leaders and staff will have guaranteed all of your commercial businesses the lowest available prices for services by marketing the bulk volume of commercial solid waste as a negotiable commodity.

In the absence of the total volume of solid waste anticipated, the pricing benefits offered to the City's commercial accounts within the RFP will surely be lost. When the volume of business is low, regardless of the operator, the price is higher and certainly this would be the case in Fayetteville with small haulers skipping from customer to customer as history has certainly shown. The solid waste industry is, as are many public enterprise operations, volume-based and priced accordingly as our RFP pricing results indicated.

What best meets the needs and requirements of the City's commercial taxpayers and solid waste generators can certainly be argued to be awarding a Contract, based upon your recent RFP, which assures the maximum financial benefit to the commercial customer and allows the City the flexibility to receive a billing and collection mechanism from the private sector that has been proven successful in the past. Future competitive bidding for the entire commercial sector certainly assures the City of Fayetteville and its commercial customers will have the lowest pricing possible from experienced and qualified solid waste management firms in the future.

Please know that we genuinely appreciate your time in reviewing this correspondence and having the discussions we feel comfortable you will have in meeting with Roger and Jimmy. We would appreciate the opportunity of meeting with you personally and have you consider the possibility of our making a formal presentation to your City Council either in a workshop or in a formal Council meeting.



We assure you we exhausted our best effort in the submission of our Proposal (RFP) to the City. Not only was our pricing indicative of our desire, but in review, we believe you will find every facet indicated our strongest desire to succeed in securing the award. We are active corporate citizens of Fayetteville and we certainly consider our operations there to be our "service headquarters" for the four states in which we operate. The invocation was offered by Reverend Ken Pritchard, Fayetteville Community Church, Middle Road, followed by the Mayor leading in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

RECOGNITION

Mayor Dawkins recognized approximately ten (10) class members from the State and Local Government Class taught by Dr. Suzan Cheek at Methodist College present in the audience to observe the Council meeting.

At this time Mayor Dawkins stated Councilmember Pillow had called to ask to be excused from tonight's meeting. Councilmember Kendrick moved to excuse Councilmember Pillow as requested, seconded by Councilmember Bolton and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

Mayor Pro-Tem Evans requested to speak on the recent property tax evaluations and moved to adopt a resolution to present to County Commissioners requesting discrepancies be checked into. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Robertson. They were advised this would have to be added to the agenda as an item. City Manager John Smith referred to the resolution concerning People Assisting Victims presented to the Mayor at a news conference this morning. Councilmember Cheek moved to add this as Item 13B., seconded by Councilmember Robertson and carried unanimously 8 to 0. Mayor Pro-Tem Evans requested to add the property tax evaluation as Item 13C., seconded by Councilmember Robertson and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

- 2A. Approve minutes of regular meeting of February 18, 1992.

Councilmember Cheek referred to Item 4B. concerning the request from Cape Fear Valley Medical Center for traffic signal on Village Drive. She stated that Mr. Jansen's request also included that the City build a turn lane into the hospital parking area for an additional \$10,000.00 making a total of \$40,000.00. Councilmember Kendrick, Chairman of the Council Streets and Roads Committee, agreed with her on this request. Dr. Cheek then moved to approve the minutes of the February 18 meeting with the amendment, "to include a right turn lane into the hospital parking area for a total of \$40,000.00." The motion was seconded by Councilmember McBryde and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

2K. Adopt Budget Ordinance Amendment 92-10.

This amendment is necessary to transfer \$135,000.00 from the Special Separation Allowance Fund to the E-911 Fund. This represents a temporary "loan" to pay the data preparation charge associated with the implementation

of the E-911 Fund. In addition, the amendment will appropriate the proceeds of a lease-purchase agreement in the amount of \$62,059.00 for dictaphone voice loggers.

Mayor Pro-Tem Evans asked what the total amount is, how much will be added to the taxpayers phone bill and for how long? Finance Director Kai Nelson responded that the \$135,000.00 is the total amount. This would be \$45,000.00 per month to the end of the fiscal year. One dollar (\$1.00) will be added to the taxpayer's bill for two years.

Mayor Pro-Tem Evans moved to approve the budget ordinance amendment as requested, seconded by Councilmember McBryde and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

3. Public Hearings:

Mayor Dawkins read the policy for the time limit on the public hearings and non-public hearings.

A. Consideration of adoption of an ordinance extending the corporate limits of the City of Fayetteville, N.C. (The Greens, Section 1, Part 1 -Property of Broadwell Land Company [Contiguous Area]) (Continued from February 18, 1992, meeting)

This item was presented by City Manager John Smith stating he had requested a continuance because of some questions he had dealing with the street construction. He reviewed the past situation and stated that this has been an honest misunderstanding between Mr. Broadwell and the City, which was the result of a very complex set of circumstances. Mr. Smith stated Mr. Broadwell had met the DOT standards for the street but feels it is too late to redesign the street for concrete curb, but instead plans to install asphalt curb. Mr. Smith stated another complicating factor is that shortly the City Council will be deciding on a new set of street standards. In order to resolve the current situation, he recommended the City either annex this street and make an exception to the current standard of concrete curb, or delay annexation pending the outcome of the City's review of street standards. This is the advertised public hearing for this date and hour.

The public hearing was opened at 7:26 p.m. and appearing in favor was Mr. Dohn Broadwell stating he feels that he does not need to explain further but was available for any questions by Council. There being none further to be heard on this matter, the public hearing was closed at 7:27 p.m.

ORDINANCE TO EXTEND THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FAYETTEVILLE. ANNEXATION ORDINANCE NO. 92-03-049.

Councilmember McBryde moved to follow the City Manager's recommendation to annex this area and make exception to the current standard of street paving and accept the street with an effective date of March 2, 1992. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Bolton and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

A copy of the foregoing ordinance is on file in the Clerk's Office in Annexation Ordinance Book 1992.

B. Consideration of petition for speed limit reduction on Ruth Street.

This item was presented by City Traffic Engineer Louis Chalmers stating this request was by a petition signed by a majority of residents. This is the advertised public hearing for citizen input.

The public hearing was opened at 7:29 p.m. and appearing in favor was Mr. Steven Moore, 112 Ruth Street. He stated because of a short distance from the front door to the street and for the safety of their families and children, they are requesting the speed limit be reduced to 25 mph. There being none further to be heard on this matter, the public hearing was closed at 7:30 p.m.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 20-106, MOTOR VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC (TRAFFIC SCHEDULE NO. 8 - SPEED CONTROL). ORDINANCE NO. NS1992-016.

Councilmember Cheek introduced the foregoing ordinance and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilmember McBryde and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

 Consideration of appeal of assessment on Southland Drive. (Continued from February 3, 1992)

This item was presented by City Attorney Bob Cogswell stating that from all the literature presented, Council can see that the only concern he has ever had in this matter was whether or not he failed to notify the property owner after we received the deed, about the deed. Mr. Cogswell stated he had a conversation with Attorney Herb Thorp this morning and asked him if he was going to seek a declaratory judgment on this matter and Mr. Thorp responded that he was not. Mr. Cogswell recommended to City Council to deny the request for appeal of assessment on Southland Drive.

Councilmember Kendrick moved to follow the recommendation to deny the request, seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Evans and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

 Consideration of adoption of demolition ordinance for property located at 110 Pond Street. (Owner: Thomas J. Keith) (Appearing Tom Keith)

This item was presented by Walter Haire, Building Inspector, requesting demolition of the dilapidated building at 110 Pond Street. He stated the owner had been given additional time but no repairs have been made.

Council recognized the property owner, Tom Keith, requesting Council not adopt this ordinance, but to allow him to rent this building as a commercial storage building to help pay the taxes and cleaning of the lots he has remaining in the area. Mr. Keith stated the Inspections Department had requested him to secure the building, which he had done. Mr. Keith added there were a lot of buildings in that area in the same condition as his, and he requested to be treated fairly.

There followed some discussion and questions and answers of Mr. Keith concerning the condition of his building.

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING THE CITY BUILDINGS INSPECTOR TO DEMOLISH AND REMOVE A STRUCTURE (110 POND STREET). ORDINANCE NO. NS1992-017.

Mayor Pro-Tem Evans moved to adopt the ordinance to be effective after 90 days unless the work is completed, seconded by Councilmember Kendrick and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

A copy of the foregoing ordinance is on file in the Clerk's Office in Ordinance Book No. NS1992.

 Consideration of request to appear before Council from James Bass regarding demolition permit fees.

Council recognized Mr. James Bass, II, requesting that they reconsider the permit fees for demolition and new construction. He stated the new construction permit fees are \$3.50 per thousand and demolition permit fees are \$4.00 per hundred. He stated he feels there should be a ceiling of \$500.00 for new construction permits. He presented to Council a list of demolition permit fees for surrounding towns and cities and requested that Council reconsider their fee schedule.

City Manager John Smith stated he feels that Mr. Bass has raised a very legitimate issue. Upon checking into this matter, he discovered the fee has been on the books since 1981 and this is exceedingly high. Mr. Smith recommended Council set the demolition fee at the same basis as the new construction fee (\$3.50 per thousand) until all fees have been reviewed. A user fee schedule study is in progress at this time.

Councilmember McBryde moved to follow the recommendation of the City Manager, seconded by Councilmember Bolton and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

Mr. Smith stated that another situation related to this has been brought to his attention, and contractors have asked that the asbestos removal not be considered as part of the demolition. He added this will be added to their user fee study.

 Consideration of a resolution for acceptance of Brinkley Street from Thad Street (formerly Third Street) to Fourth Street for City maintenance.

This item was presented by City Manager John Smith stating this section of Brinkley Street has never been opened, maintained or accepted and recommends Council not accept the street unless it is brought up to City standards.

Councilmember Bolton moved to follow the recommendation to not accept the street unless it is brought up to City standards, seconded by Councilmember Kendrick and carried unanimously $8\ \text{to}\ 0$.

 Consideration of agreement for Enhanced 911 service between City of Fayetteville and Carolina Telephone and Telegraph.

This item was presented by Assistant City Manager for Operations Roger Stancil stating everything is in place, and the City is 60 days away from having Enhanced 911 inside the City of Fayetteville. City Attorney Bob Cogswell stated he had spoken with the telephone company's attorney and they are in agreement that the paragraph dealing with willful and wanton misconduct should be added to the middle paragraph of Section XII. The wording is as follows: "The provisions of this Section XII are not intended to conflict with Chapter 62A, NCGS, in that the company shall only be liable for willful or wanton misconduct in connection with developing, adopting, implementing, maintaining or operating any 911 system."

Councilmember McBryde moved to approve the agreement for the E-911 with the addition of the paragraph recommended by the City Attorney. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Kendrick and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

 Consideration of adoption of resolution fixing date of public hearing on question of annexation pursuant to G.S. 160A-31, as amended. (Skibo Square - Contiguous area)

This item was presented by Assistant City Manager for Operations Roger Stancil with a request to set the date of the public hearing for March 16th to be in line with the scheduled hearings and proposed initial zoning of this area by the Planning Board in April.

RESOLUTION FIXING DATE OF PUBLIC HEARING (MARCH 16, 1992) ON QUESTION OF ANNEXATION PURSUANT TO GS 160A-31, AS AMENDED (SKIBO SQUARE). RESOLUTION NO. R1992-030.

Councilmember Bolton introduced the foregoing resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Evans and carried 7 to 1 with Councilmember Ross voting in opposition.

 Consideration of adoption of resolution identifying an area as being under consideration for future annexation. (Readoption of previously identified area)

This item was presented by Assistant City Manager for Operations Roger Stancil with a recommendation for adoption of the resolution.

RESOLUTION IDENTIFYING THE AREA DESCRIBED HEREIN AS BEING UNDER CONSIDERATION FOR FUTURE ANNEXATION. RESOLUTION NO. R1992-031.

Mayor Pro-Tem Evans introduced the foregoing resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilmember Cheek and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

A copy of the foregoing resolution is on file in the Clerk's Office in Resolutions Book R1992.

11. Consideration of proposals for commercial garbage collection.

This item was presented by City Manager John Smith. He reviewed the information presented as backup in the agenda which included six (6) options. Of the six (6) options, he recommended Option No. 6, which was not included in the bids. It is for the City to allow totally open competition and not regulate the service. This option takes the City totally out of the picture and allows the free market to set standards and prices.

Mayor Pro-Tem Evans moved to follow Option 1 to enter into a 1-year contract with low bidder of ARS. The motion died for a lack of second.

Following lengthy discussion, Council requested the City Manager to provide further information at the next meeting, if possible.

12. Appointments:

A. Nominations to fill two vacancies on Appearance Commission.

Councilmember Cheek nominated Jimmy Kaiser, Jr., for the unexpired term to December 1992 in the Engineer Category. Councilmember Robertson nominated Douglas Russell Smith in the At-large Category to fill the term to December 1993.

B. Nominations to fill seven vacancies on Human Relations Commission.

Councilmember Ross nominated Ms. Leslie Kiewra and Dr. Emma Green for first terms and Carrie Malveau for a second 2-year term. Councilmember McBryde nominated Dr. Bruce Pulliam for a second 2-year term. Councilmember Kendrick nominated Judy Lowe to serve a second 2-year term.

Nominations are still needed to fill the vacancies of Mr. R. H. Beatty and Mrs. Mettarene McLean.

13. Administrative Reports:

A. Report on Street Lighting Improvement Program.

Mr. Smith referred to materials in the agenda packet. He specifically referred to the proposed fiscal year 91-92 Street Lighting Improvement Program. No. 1 is the Branson Street area and No. 2 is the Owen Drive/Camden Road area, which are highest priority assigned jointly by the Police Department, Traffic Engineering and PWC. The amount of \$75,000.00 appropriation for lighting enhancements will be included in PWC's fiscal year 1993 budget. Mr. Smith stated the entire list of 1 through 12 would be approximately \$290,000.00 in PWC's budget.

Following some discussion, Mayor Dawkins stated it was the consensus of Council that this (the increase of the \$75,000) be included in PWC's budget because of the importance of the lighting projects.

B. Request for resolution from People Assisting Victims.

Councilmember Bolton moved to have the City Attorney draft a resolution for the next regular Council meeting agenda, seconded by Councilmember Robertson and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

C. Request of Mayor Pro-Tem Evans concerning property tax evaluations.

Mayor Pro-Tem Evans moved to refer (to Cumberland County Commissioners) the concern of the Mayor and City Council as to the fairness of the 1992 property evaluation and with a recommendation that they give this their attention. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Robertson.

Following some discussion, Councilmembers McBryde, Kendrick and Bolton agreed that the City Council as a body should not intervene because there are ways for taxpayers to appeal their assessment values. Following the discussion, Mayor Dawkins called for the vote, and it failed 2 to 6 with Councilmembers Ross, Cheek, McBryde, Bolton, Kendrick and Torrey voting in opposition.

At this time Councilmember Ross was recognized stating she had talked with someone in (Senator) Mr. Rose's office. They are sending a packet of materials down for grant applications and Ms. Ross asked City Manager Smith which grants would be of greatest concern to Council. Mr. Smith responded that, at this point, he could not furnish this information but hoped to be able to give Council a report soon as to the progress on some applications submitted through the Governor's Crime Commission.
